Utah Legislators are pushing for a resolution supporting a system interconnecting seven central Wasatch ski resorts between Salt Lake County and Summit County. The resolution was drafted by Sen. Wayne Niederhauser, R-Sandy and urges interconnection as a means to bolster the ski and snowboard industry and enhance Utah's economy. S.C.R.010 is up for consideration at the Senate Workforce Service Community and Economic Development Standing Committee.

FCOZ Update

FCOZ will be up for further consideration at the Salt Lake County Council meeting this coming Tuesday. The discussion will continue to center around a version of the FCOZ revisions, which includes a measure of input and compromise from Salt Lake City Public Utilities and other parties. This version has been altered from the original revisions the Planning Department had proposed. One of the restrictions being proposed is to mitigate unintended consequences by limiting year round uses to already operating resorts, until the greater FCOZ revision can commence in March.
