MEASURING DEVICE NOTICE

No. SEAA 1071

TO: Second North West Canal and Irrigation Co.

It has come to the attention of the Division of Water Rights (Division) that the Second North West Canal and Irrigation Company (Company) well, located west of Beaver City just south and east of the north Beaver City freeway interchange, is not equipped with a water meter and is not currently regulated by the water commissioner.

Inspection of the well and review of the water right records by Division staff indicates: the well is capable of producing a substantial flow of water; it discharges into and provides supplemental water to the Company's canal; and the only water right in the well is 77-1063 which is limited to supply 60 acre-feet of water to irrigate 15 acres of land.

Given these circumstances, the potential exists that the well could easily be pumped beyond the limitations of the water right. To guard against that possibility, the well will be included in the Beaver River Distribution System, an assessment account will be established for it, and the water commissioner will regulate it and limit its use to 60 acre feet per year. Regulation of the well will require that it be equipped with a properly installed and maintained water meter.

Section 73-5-4 of the Utah Code Annotated, 1953 as amended, states in part:

"Every person using water in this state shall construct or install and maintain a substantial head gate, cap, valve or other controlling works, weir, flume and measuring device at each point where water is diverted or turned out, for the purpose of regulating and measuring the quantity of water that may be used. Such controlling works or measuring device shall be of such design as the state engineer may approve and so that the same can be locked and kept set by him or his assistants... If the owner of irrigation works, canals, reservoirs, wells,

pumps or tunnels shall refuse or neglect to construct such headgates, caps, valves, flumes or measuring devices after thirty days notice to do so by the state engineer, the state engineer may forbid the use of water until the user thereof shall comply with this requirement, or the state engineer may proceed to construct or install or cause to be installed such controlling works or measuring devices, and the cost of the same shall be a lien against the lands and water rights served thereby, and the state engineer is authorized to bring such action in the name of the state to foreclose such lien."

Therefore, you are hereby notified that your well must be equipped with a totalizing water meter that is properly installed and perpetually maintained according to the manufacturer's specifications. The meter must provide readout in acre-feet or other units readily convertible to acre-feet and must be made available to the commissioner for taking water use readings. The water meter must be properly installed within 30 days from the date of this notice.

The well will be inspected for compliance at the end of the 30-day period. If a water meter has not been installed, the State Engineer will issue an Order to Cease the Use of Water. If necessary, the State Engineer will seek a court order requiring the use of water be ceased until such time as the water meter is installed and working properly.
