Dear Sir:

We are in need of information concerning available water and possible irrigation rights from Little Beaver Creek in the vicinity of Township 12 North, Range 113 West, 6th P. M. Wyoming, and Township 3 North, 115 East, Utah.

Harry Max Bullock of McKinnon, Wyoming, has made homestead filing and application for classification on Lot 6 and the $NW\frac{1}{4}SE\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 19, Township 12 North, Range 113 West, which just borders the State of Utah on the Wyoming side. In making the classification of this land, it is necessary that we know if water is available for irrigation. Apparently the creek from which water would be obtained heads in Utah, thereby placing the responsibility of issuance of water rights in your hands. This tract of land was filed as a desert land entry by Newton D. Bullock on November 10, 1911, and cancelled on November 8, 1924. It was again filed as a homestead entry by Reed Allen Foote of Lonetree, Wyoming, on November 22, 1932 and relinquished on October 20, 1933. Information obtained from local residents leads us to believe that the State of Utah refused to grant either of these men water rights for the land above described, hence necessitating the cancellation and relinquishment.

I would appreciate your giving me any information regarding the two cases just described which you might have, and also if it will be possible for the present applicant Harry Max Bullock to obtain a water right on these lands should his homestead filing be approved.

Harry Max Bullock is also planning to lease land owned by the State of Utah in Township 3 North, Range 115 East of the following description: Section 13, Lots 1 and 2, and the $N\frac{1}{2}SE\frac{1}{4}$. In addition to the state land, he plans to acquire Lots 3 and 4 of the same section by homestead entry or public sale in order to fill out his present homestead entry. In

your opinion, would it be possible for him to obtain water rights on the land described in Utah?

I wish to thank you very kindly for your help in this matter.
