

Dear Mr. Bishop:

On December 2nd I had a conference with representatives of the Utah State Engineer's office, regarding the proposed agreement on Burnt Fork Creek. Prior to this time I have received some material regarding the irrigated acreage in both Utah and Wyoming from the Bureau of Reclamation through Mr. Berg's office in Cheyenne, but the map which he gave me was prepared on a scale of one-inch to the mile, which is hardly large enough for the purpose. It was decided that more adequate information would be necessary before an agreement could be reached as to the irrigated acreage of Burnt Fork, and it is my thought that if you write Mr. Debler and ask if he will furnish copies of the original plane-table sheets covering this area. This would cover Township 12 North, Range 111 and 112, west, and that part of the lands in Utah in the Burnt Fork area alone, covering Township 3 North, Range 17 East, Salt Lake Meridian.

These sheets do not completely cover the information desired, for they do not show the location of any of the ditches, but I think that the sheets can be used to verify the irrigated acreage in the area in question, and can be taken to assist in a reconnaissance to be made at a later date by the representative from the State of Utah and myself, to supply whatever defects may exist in the information which we now have.

Mr. Watson informed me that his office will bear whatever his proportion of the cost will be, and I assume that your office has a fund to which the cost of these sheets may be charged.

It was decided that this reconnaissance will probably be made at the earliest possible opportunity in the Spring of 1944, so that if possible a temporary agreement may be reached covering the distribution of the water during the 1944 season. If you have any suggestion to make regarding this matter, I would appreciate if you would forward it on to me.
