Dear Mr. Hubbard:

RE: MILL DAM DIST.

I have your letter of August 31 and do not know who is prohibiting you from the use of your water in Hubbard Spring Ditch.

There has been some attempt this year to have a water commissioner appointed although nothing has been done in accordance with the decree made by the court covering the appointment of a commissioner. The situation on the Mill Dam System seems to be just as mixed as ever. There is no agreement about who shall be appointed as water commissioner and I have been unable, so far, to collect all the money which was due Mr. Ward when he was acting as commissioner in 1929.

As nearly as I can make out there are several personal fights down there which seem more important than the distribution of water. This office is willing to take care of the distribution provided it can be done on the same lines as other systems in the state. On the other hand this office does not furnish policemen and that is apparently what is needed.

I understand that there will be a hearing before Judge Harris in reference to the situation on the 14th of this month and I am writing to the Judge to learn if he wishes me to be present. It might be well for you to be at Brigham on that date if convenient.

With reference to my coming to Willard and looking over the situation I would say that I do not believe that this will do any good at all. I have the report made by Mr. Jerman on his last visit and I am quite sure that any arrangements which I might try to make as a result of a visit to Willard would be up-set within twenty four hours after I left the town.
